ANCIENT ANSWERS TO MODERN QUESTIONS

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Take Heed That No Man Deceive You

Jesus Christ said, "Take heed that no man deceive you. For many shall come in my name, saying I am Christ; and shall deceive many" (Matthew 24:4-5).

We live in an age of many Christian movements. From simple operations to huge television productions of religious show-biz, one can pick up just about anything. And Jesus said it would be that way with many preaching Him as though having His authority. Many will even do great works but will be woefully disappointed when Christ says, "I never knew you."

Many will say to Jesus in that day, "Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? And . . . done many wonderful works? And then I will profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity" (Matthew 7:22-23). Thus we are warned to beware.

Beware of evil fruit. "Ye shall know them by their fruits," Jesus said in Matthew 7:16. A corrupt tree brings forth evil fruit; this is, hurtful, malicious or vicious fruit as seen in Matthew 7:18.

Jesus compares the fruit of false prophets to thorns and thistles. Thorns and thistles wound. Spiritually, such fruit does not provoke love, but bitterness, malice, and intolerance towards others such as is found in the rhetoric of some hate groups.

"The spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits . . . speaking lies in hypocrisy. ." (I Timothy 4:1).

But, "By this shall all men know that you are my disciples, if you have love one to another" (John 13:35). They will not be promoting hate, lawlessness, how to make bombs, or use arms in some kind of faithless effort. A good tree does not produce evil fruit.

Beware of bold prophecy. Such statements lure many. In one publication, years ago, a writer wrote that the U.S. was to be attacked in May of 1988 and that Jesus would return on the Feast of Trumpets 1994. His proclamation never came to pass. Such predictions have often broken the would-be prophet, no matter how sincere they may have been. Unlike many prophets of the Bible, such as Jonah or Amos, false prophets are presumptuous.

Therefore, "When a prophet speaketh in the name of the Lord, if the thing follow not, nor come to pass, that is the thing which the Lord has not spoken, but the prophet has spoken it presumptuously: Thou shalt not be afraid of him" (Deuteronomy 18:22).

Beware of strange doctrines. They usually accompany false prophets. Once a person becomes intrigued by such doctrines, it is easy to be indoctrinated with different slants on scripture.

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Soon, some become bold in proselytizing.

Generally, within any group, beliefs are basically the same. But some divide those beliefs by bringing opposing ideas, taking advantage of a church's liberty; working in sheep's clothing but, inwardly, are ravening wolves, not sparing the flock; testing the convictions of others, not knowing sometimes, that they themselves are being tested. It's too bad, but Christ does say to beware because such will come.

Christians should not fear to raise an eyebrow at so-called **new truth**. There is to come a falling away. And being on guard is only prudent! *"And that because of false brethren unawares brought in, who came in privily (covertly) to spy out our liberty which we have in Jesus Christ, that they might bring us into bondage; to whom we gave place by subjection, no not for an hour; that the truth of the gospel might continue with you"* (Galatians 2:5). Paul did not

put up with such for very long. The only bondage we should be in is to Christ and not some man or another gospel.

Beware of self-proclaimed prophets. One can eventually detect whether their ministry is vainly inspired or divinely inspired by their fruit. It may not be easy right away, but if they preach contrary to the doctrine of Christ (Hebrews 6) or if they preach the

breaking of the law through grace, or the doing away of the fourth commandment, for example, beware!

The apostle Paul said, *"Such are false apostles, deceitful workers, transforming themselves into the apostles of Christ"* (II Corinthians 11:13). So, beware of those who have somehow given themselves the position and boast as one sent from God.

Beware of personal weaknesses. Instability in faith may bring about susceptibility to outside influences. It is good for brethren to dwell in unity but any number of things may bring about disunity -- the failings of others, disappointments, envies, or perceived wrongs among fellow saints. Often it is resentment that allows a root of bitterness to take hold.

Consequently, a Christian may become tossed to and fro, and carried about (turned around) with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, whereby they lie in wait to deceive (Ephesians 4:14). *"Spots they are and blemishes, sporting themselves with their own deceivings while they feast (fellowship) with you. . . beguiling unstable souls; a heart they have exercised with covetous practices..."* II Peter 2:13-14.

A saint should be *"holding fast, the faithful word because there are many...deceivers, especially they of the circumcision"* (Titus 1:10-11). For sound doctrine the Bible is our guide (Hebrews 6; II Timothy 3:16).

Beware of vain traditions. If one must follow a man, follow him as he follows Christ. But beware if he or she deviates. The

can be contrary to scripture and based upon human tradition.

Concerning tradition, for example, Jesus not only called the Pharisees hypocrites, but lawbreakers as well. He said they were full of hypocrisy and iniquity. To those preferring tradition over God's commandment, Jesus said, *"Full well ye reject the commandment of God, that ye may keep your own tradition"* (Mark 7:9). Then he cited their breaking of the commandment concerning honoring mother and father, "Making the word of God of none effect."

In John 7:19 Christ said, *"Did not Moses give you the law, and none of you keepeth the law?"* "In vain," he said, *"they worship me."* Jesus set the example. A Christian cannot go wrong in following Christ (I Peter 2:21).

Finally, a Christian should not be easily persuaded. In a multitude of counselors there is safety. Prayer and study are vital; so is faith that God's Spirit will guide into all truth.

The apostle Paul marveled that the Galatians were so soon removed from God and the grace of Christ unto another gospel. Some gospels are after man, but the

forth good fruit. Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire. Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them. Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven. Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? And in thy name have cast out devils? And in thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity" (Matthew 7:16-23 KJV).

RIGHTEOUS - Psalm 119:172 My tongue shall speak of thy word: for all thy commandments are righteousness.

TRUTH - Psalm 119:142 Thy righteousness is an everlasting righteousness, and thy law is the truth.

GOOD - I Timothy 1:8 But we know that the law is good, if a man use it lawfully.

JUST - Romans 7:12 Wherefore the law is holy, and the commandment holy and just and good.

LIGHT - Proverbs 6:23 For the commandment is a lamp; and the law is light; and reproofs of instruction are the way of life.

EVERLASTING - Psalm 111:7-8 The works of his hands are verity and judgment; all his commands are sure. They stand fast for ever and ever, and are done in truth and uprightness.

"I will meditate also of all Thy work, and talk of Thy doings."

The relentless urgency in which our world races for the next "new thing" leaves many exhausted and confused. Technology antiquates itself almost daily and people have less and less time for anything other than zipping through their fast paced and high-tech lives. Where does one look to find something enduring?

The wonderful words of life spoken by Jesus Christ are timeless. They are as relevant today as when they were spoken by Him when He walked among his creation. They are truly "Ancient Answers to Modern Questions."

One example of the timelessness of His teaching is found in the 2nd chapter of the Gospel of Mark in verses 21 and 22:

"No one sews a patch of unshrunk cloth on an old garment; otherwise the patch pulls away from it, the new from

the old, and a worse tear results.

And no one puts new wine into old wineskins; otherwise the wine will burst the skins, and the wine is lost, and the skins as well; but one puts new wine into fresh wineskins."(NASB)

In this lesson, Jesus presents for us the results of enjoining the old with the new of certain *physical* items. The Apostle Paul adds insight to the depth of Christ's words in his second epistle to the Corinthians; verse 17 of chapter 5 explains:

"Therefore if any man is in Christ, he is a new creature; the old things passed away; behold, new things have come."

In Romans 6 and verse 6 Paul contrasts this "newness of life" to the "old self of sin".

"Knowing this, that our old self

was crucified with Him, that our body of sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves to sin"(NASB).

To walk in the newness of life through Jesus Christ (Romans 6:4) and follow Him, we as disciples of Jesus must be transformed by the *renewing* of our minds (Romans 12:2). By becoming new in Him we are to leave the old behind. Not by simply adding a small "portion" of the *newness* in Christ Jesus to our *old self*, nor housing this *newness* in the "skin" of the *old self*.

We must put away all things that are opposed and contrary to our Savior Jesus Christ and His words of life. Not by our own power however, only in the power of Jesus our Savior.
